A Commitment to Service

Dear Employees:

On New Year's Day, I was sworn in as your Mayor. With a new year, a new administration, and a fresh start, I believe we have a remarkable opportunity for renewed partnerships and approaches across our community.

Managing the opportunities and challenges facing South Bend will not be easy, nor will it happen overnight, but we are entering a period of positive change. This administration will launch innovative plans to move our city forward, but we continue to work hard to maintain a true commitment to service.

I wanted to take this opportunity to share six initiatives my office will launch in the coming weeks.

New Economic Partnerships: The mayor's office is working to convene an Economic Summit to coordinate the activities and organizations connected to economic development in our area. It is my goal to lay out a new economic vision for our community as well as agree on a smarter division of labor among our varying groups.

High Ethical Standards: On New Year's Day, I issued an executive order introducing a new ethics code for the city. It was time to lay out a citywide policy to ensure that all the departments and employees in the city understand expectations for doing business in an ethical and transparent manner.

Customer Service Mentality: The administration will design ways that city employees can track and resolve citizens' issues efficiently by using more advanced technology. This trend will culminate with the creation of a 311 line for non-emergency municipal issues by the end of the year.

Strong Partnerships with Schools: My office's dialogue with the South Bend Community School Corporation begins this month at the School Board's first meeting of the year. I have been elected to deliver safety, growth, and services, and none of this is possible without a strong educational system.

Transparency and Accessibility: I will conduct a series of "Mayor's Night Out" and "Mayor's Night In" events at which citizens can find me and my department heads directly to speak about concerns and ideas. I will not serve from behind a desk, but seek to visit our neighborhoods and community centers to listen to the concerns of the people. Stay tuned for details...

Empowering Volunteers to Help: My office will work to create new volunteer opportunities for citizens who want to campaign for the city and help rejuvenate our neighborhoods, schools, and public spaces. It's going to take all of us working

together to make our community an even better place to call home.

It is an honor to serve as your Mayor. I look forward to working with you to move our community forward.

A Little Bit About Our Mayor

Mayor Pete Buttigieg, the city's thirty-second mayor, was sworn into office on January 1, 2012. As mayor, he supervises the enforcement of municipal codes and state laws, appoints and supervises department officers, and communicates with the Common Council on financial issues and policy affairs. He also serves as the representative for the city and its residents for special events and ceremonies.

Mayor Pete is working to strengthen the local economy by retaining and attracting businesses, partnering with the local public school system, managing a cutting-edge and transparent city administration, and providing safety and security by empowering neighborhoods throughout our community.

Mayor Pete was born in South Bend and grew up in the North Shore Triangle neighborhood of the city. He was valedictorian of St. Joseph's High School in 2000 and graduated from Harvard University in 2004. He worked for former U.S. Defense Secretary William Cohen in Washington, D.C. before he was awarded a Rhodes Scholarship to study philosophy, politics, and economics at Oxford from 2005 to 2007.

After obtaining a degree from Oxford, Mayor Pete worked for McKinsey & Company, a top consulting firm, where he was responsible for advising senior business and government leaders on major decisions related to economic development, energy policy, strategic business initiatives, and logistics. His work took him around the country and the world, including to Iraq and Afghanistan.

Mayor Pete is also an officer in the U.S. Navy Reserve. He lives in the same neighborhood where he grew up, where he is restoring a once-vacant home.

South Bend Fire Department Received a Grant to Purchase New Equipment

Congressman Joe Donnelly announced that the South Bend Fire Department received a \$600,694 Operations and Safety grant from the Federal Emergency Management Agency and Department of Homeland Security Assistance to Firefighters Grant Program (AFG). The South Bend Fire Department will use the grant money to purchase new equipment, including Self-Contained Breathing Apparatuses and a portable hazardous material chemical identifier.

“The South Bend Fire Department tirelessly serves our community,” said Donnelly. “I’m pleased to announce this grant because it will allow the South Bend Fire Department to purchase much-needed equipment to help first responders stay safe while continuing to protect our community. Congratulations to the South Bend Fire Department on their successful grant application, and I want to thank all first-responders in north central Indiana for their dedicated service.”

“With this Assistance to Firefighters Grant the South Bend Fire Department will now be able to replace some obsolete equipment,” said Mark Nowicki, Assistant Chief of the

Wells Fargo Provides Grant to the City

January 18 **Mayor Pete Buttigieg** accepted a grant for the City of South Bend Municipal Energy Office from Wells Fargo. Buttigieg, joined by **Jon Burke** and **Jonathon Geels** of the Municipal Energy Office, met with bank representatives at the Wells Fargo building downtown on Thursday morning. “We will use this funding from Wells Fargo to initiate a pilot project to look into upgrading all street lighting within the city,” said Burke.

Wells Fargo representatives presented a \$12,500 check to the City of South Bend for an energy savings lighting project. Wells Fargo Environmental Affairs group also provided a \$6,250 (or 2 to 1) match, making the total donation to the city \$18,750. In addition, some of the grant will go to promote urban gardening groups in the city. The lighting portion of the grant amounts to \$8,000 and the urban gardening receives the remaining \$4,500.

The lighting portion of the grant could grow into a larger collaborative effort with Indiana Michigan Power to potentially replace some 13,000 street lights throughout South Bend.

“Each month, the city spends \$85,000 on street lighting,” said Buttigieg. “This technology consumes less than half of the electricity as current lighting and will dramatically reduce maintenance costs. Being more efficient and finding cost savings is a win-win for South Bend and its residents.”

Mayor Buttigieg and the Municipal Energy Office continue to develop a Strategic Energy Plan to guide policy in the future. The plan includes building efficiency, energy conservation, transportation, renewable energy, and health and sustainability initiatives.

“It’s opening up opportunities to partner with other organizations and civil entities that we wouldn’t have previously. The collaboration is important to implementing this energy-saving initiative,” said Geels.

The second portion of the grant focuses on sustainable agriculture in an urban setting and will aid in the development of a healthy, locally grown food supply in our urban neighborhoods. This funding will support the rapidly growing gardening groups within the City.

South Bend Fire Department. “The department can now purchase for its firefighters 90 new Self-Contained Breathing Apparatuses, and the department can also purchase, for our state designated regional Hazardous Materials Team, a new portable chemical identifier. This grant will allow our department to provide South Bend firefighters with new, reliable equipment that will assist them in performing their jobs safely and efficiently as they accomplish their mission of saving lives and property.”

AFG grants, intended to enhance the ability of fire departments to protect the safety of both the public and first responders, are awarded through a competitive grant process.

Winter Weather Driving Tips

It's the Most Treacherous Time of the Year: Dig Out and Drive Safely

From the driveway to the highway, getting your car unstuck and back on the road can be a pain. Unless you've already traded in your car for a snowmobile, you should be prepared for whatever the season throws at you (or piles on top of you).

First, make sure your car is winterized and ready for battle. Then follow these tips to make your trek into the winter wonderland a safe one.

Protect your windshield after Mother Nature's frosting

- The cardinal rule for de-icing your windows? Hot water is a no-no, unless you like that shattered glass look.
- To begin, start your car and turn on the front and rear defrosters to help soften the ice and snow. It will also help warm up your car while you work.
- When you're ready to begin scraping the ice, opt for a plastic ice scraper. Plastic scrapers are less likely to damage or scratch the surface of the glass.
- Your wipers weren't made for heavy lifting. Use them only after you've completely cleared off the snow and ice from your windshield.
- Make sure your car has plenty of windshield washer fluid before you get out on the slush, salt and sand covered roads.

How to take your car from snow-packed to road-worthy

- First things first...you want the snow off your car but you probably want to save the paint. Opt for brushes designed for auto snow removal and leave the shovel in the shed.
- Whatever you do - don't forget the roof! In fact, failing to clean off your car can be illegal. You don't want a block of ice the size of a mattress flying off your car into traffic.
- Don't forget to brush off your mirrors, head and tail lights and license plates.
- Carbon monoxide is no laughing matter, so check your tailpipe to be sure it's free of snow whenever your car is running.
- When you are ready to hit the road, shovel around your wheels and under the front and rear bumpers to clear away any snow. And above all, please be careful out there.

On the Road Again: Driving Tips for Snow and Ice

A winterized car is a great start, but it's only part of the safe winter driving equation. Follow these driving tips to keep yourself safe and secure when roads are slippery.



Slow Down. In normal conditions, you should maintain a following distance of three seconds between you and another car. On winter roads, increase that to a full 8 to 10 seconds. Yes, that may mean slow going, but a little patience will keep you a lot safer on the road.

Get Unstuck the Right Way. Avoid the temptation to spin your wheels. You'll just dig yourself into a deeper hole. Instead, determine the path of least resistance between your car and solid ground. Then, clear the snow behind and in front of all four tires and liberally spread sand or kitty litter in front of and behind the drive wheels. Keep in mind that the sharper your front wheels are turned, the more resistance to movement in either direction you create. Consequently, try to keep the front tires as straight as possible.

Tackle a Skid the Smart Way. If your car skids, keep a cool head, and follow these steps:

- Don't panic.
- Don't slam on the brakes.
- Take your foot off the gas.
- Steer your car in the direction you want to go.
- Wait for the car to slow down so you can regain control.

You can prepare for a skid by practicing. Go to an open parking lot and practice braking on icy or snowy surfaces. (Yes, you are allowed to think this is fun.) More importantly, you'll better know how to handle yourself when you skid in traffic.

Mike Schmuhl, Chief of Staff

Beware These Empty Calories!

10 Foods That Can Pile on the Pounds

Culprit #1: Anything with Lots of Sugar or Other Sweeteners. Americans are consuming 83 more calories per day from caloric sweeteners than they did in 1977. And those extra 83 calories a day turn into a whopping 2,490 calories per month. To what items do we point the finger as the primary cause of these extra calories? Shockingly, it's not even food we eat—these added calories come mainly from soft drinks and fruit drinks. This list shows the amounts of sugar:

Soda, sweetened beverages (fruit drinks, ice teas) have 9 teaspoons per 12 oz.

Cakes, cookies, pastries and pies have 6 teaspoons per 1/16 of a pie or frosted cake

Syrup, honey, molasses and sweetened toppings have 3 teaspoons per tablespoon

Candy has 3 teaspoons per 1 ounce chocolate bar

Frozen milk desserts, ice cream and frozen yogurt have 3 teaspoons per 1/2 cup

So here are my nominees for the top five high-fat, empty-calorie culprits:

Fast food. Swearing off fast food isn't the only answer. We can make better choices at fast food chains, such as ordering charbroiled chicken sandwiches (hold the mayonnaise), bean burritos, and pizza with extra tomato sauce and vegetable toppings. And we can eat fast food less often—maybe once a week instead of every day.

Mayonnaise. Mayonnaise is basically made up of three ingredients: vegetable oil, egg yolks, and vinegar (it's not the vinegar that I'm worried about). Mayonnaise makes this list because it is loaded with calories and fat grams. Many people slather around 2 tablespoons of mayonnaise or mayonnaise-based sauces on their sandwich. This adds up to 198 calories and 22 grams of fat. See what I mean?

Chips and microwave popcorn. Although the potato and corn kernels that go into making these popular snack items have some nutritional value, once you coat them in partially hydrogenated oil, they top the charts in calories and fat grams. A 2-ounce bag of potato chips contains around 303 calories and 20 grams of fat. A bag of microwave popping corn (not the light kind) totals 435 calories and 25 grams of fat.

Crackers. Crackers may seem like they would be good snack choices. But if you look on the ingredient labels, they're usually just white flour with partially hydrogenated fat—neither of which does much for the nutritional value of your diet. Calories and fat can add up quickly here, too. A 2-ounce serving of Ritz Bits, for example, totals 302 calories and 17 grams of fat, while the same size serving of cheese crackers comes to around 285 calories and 14 grams of fat.

Packaged frozen snacks. Walk down the frozen-food aisle and you'll find scores of packaged savory snacks just waiting to be popped into the microwave: hot pockets, pizza rolls, egg rolls, etc. Trouble is, these are full of partially hydrogenated fats and oils. Just one pepperoni pizza pocket totals around 510 calories and 26 grams of fat.
